Purpose and Overview

The purpose of this retreat was to ground our intentions, find inspiration, and exchange lessons among leaders at the intersection of food systems and planetary health.

In this retreat, we aimed to:

- Further shared respect for the land and how we can cultivate conscious food systems as a pathway to planetary health and transformation.
- Create and strengthen relationships among leaders working in food systems, climate responses, and planetary health.
- Build our collective capacity to address at a deeper level the underlying values and worldviews at the heart of current food-related social and environmental predicaments.
- Gather before Climate Week NYC and the UN Summit of the Future to transform how we mindfully step into these important occasions and to create a more compassionate world.

We engaged with facilitated dialogue, contemplative practices, conversations on inner and outer change-making efforts, inspired and inspiring speakers, and time for being outside on the land reflecting on how to apply insights to our lives and work.

Outmoded mindsets and self-interested habits of thought drive many of today's environmental predicaments. Deep societal change and adaptation is necessary, but requires movement in dominant values and narratives at the heart of current systems. To be effective, our actions need to be grounded in different ways of thinking and being.

Food systems are at the core of current polycrises and polyopportunities. Transformation in food systems is instrumental to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals. Through food, we cultivate very tangible yet sometimes far-reaching connections with the land, each other, and ourselves.

Pathways to Planetary Health and the UNDP-convened Conscious Food Systems Alliance partnered to host a retreat to explore conscious food systems as a promising pathway for planetary health and transformation.

The Pathways to Planetary Health program at the Garrison Institute develops practical, scalable approaches to addressing pressing social and environmental challenges. We recognize that the wellbeing of people and Earth are deeply interconnected and we build understanding of planetary health through scientific inquiry and contemplative practice across traditions. We apply insights to align systems with nature across four pathways: biodiversity stewardship, regenerative economies, ecological cultures, and the commons and the common good.

Convened by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), whose Nature Pledge emphasizes a global value shift, the Conscious Food Systems Alliance (CoFSA) supports people from across food and agriculture systems to cultivate the inner capacities that activate systemic change and regeneration.

and biodynamic farming practices. He oversees the extensive farming operations at Stone Barns, integrating a holistic farm team that works tog ether on multi-species grass-fed livestock, grains, field crops, greenhouse, fruit, flowers, wild landscapes, and compost in a four-season regenerative system. Jack leads our programming in innovative tool design, breeding and monitoring work that supports the efforts of small- and mid-size farmers, and was part of the core team that developed the Conservation Action Plan that led to our management of 350 acres of public lands in the Rockefeller State Park Preserve. He is a frequent public speaker and has appeared at food and farming conferences and summits across the country. He holds a B.S. in horticulture from the University of Rhode Island.

On the side: With his wife and fellow farmer, Shannon, Jack has two farm -raised sons. He is a lifelong musician and a commissioner of his local volunteer fire department, and has served on several boards of agricultural organizations including Johnny's Selected Seeds, Cornell Cooperative Extension, and the Dutchess/Putnam/Westchester (NY) Farm Bureau.

Shannon Algiere, one of the first employees on the farm at Stone Barns Center for Food and Agriculture, brings over 25 years of experience in holistic farm design, crops production, garden and greenhouse management, and farm-based education.

She was introduced to an agrarian lifestyle as a young girl, frolicking in strawberry fields and peach orchards and showing goats and rabbits at local fairs. While studying at the University of Rhode Island, Shannon worked at a natural food cooperative, where she was inspired to think about food sourcing and holistic nutrition.

She has worked to promote sustainable models in the floral industry by celebrating the elegance and ecology of connecting regional grower economies with designers, and she has led training and workshops on growing and marketing cut flowers at NOFA, Stone Barns Center's Young Farmer's and Oregon State University Small Farms conferences.

Molly Anderson

William R. Kenan Jr. Professor of Food Studies, Middlebury College

Molly Anderson directs the Academic Program in Food Studies at Middlebury College in Vermont and teaches about hunger and food security, fixing food systems, and sustainability. She is especially interested in multi-actor collaborations for sustainable food systems, sustainability metrics and assessment, food system resilience, human rights in the food system, and the right to food in the US and other industrialized countries. She is also interested in bridging interests and concerns of academicians, community-based activists and social movements. She is involved in food system reform and planning at the local, state and regional scales; participates in the regional Food Solutions New England network and the national Inter-Institutional Network for Food, Agriculture & Sustainability; and is a member of the International Panel of Experts on Sustainable Food Systems (IPES-Food). She was a Coordinating Lead Author on the International Assessment of Agricultural Knowledge, Science & Technology for Development (IAASTD) and served on the Board of the Community Food Security Coalition for 6 years. She has worked as a private consultant for domestic and international organizations, with Oxfam America, and at Tufts University, where she was the founding Director of the Agriculture, Food and Environment Graduate Program in the School of Nutrition Science & Policy and directed Tufts Institute of the Environment for 2 years. Molly earned an interdisciplinary Ph.D. in Systems Ecology from University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and a B.S. and M.S. in natural resource management and a certificate in Latin American Studies from Colorado State University.

Jason Angell

Co-Director, Ecological Citizen's Project

Jason Angell is currently the Co- Director of the Ecological Citizen's Project (ECP), a non- profit based in the Hudson Valley, NY that works to grow citizen-led campaigns to produce a more just, healthy, democratic and sustainable way-of-life. The ECP helped establish New York's second CCA, developed the Community Congress which has engaged over 2,500 community members in participatory democracy, and developed New York's first local carbon sequestration inventory. The ECP is currently building the

Regenerative Communities program to develop community owned solar that turns profits from the sun into a living wage for new, diverse farmers that feed their communities. Jason was a Co-Founder of the Coalition of Communities of Color in the Pacific Northwest and served as the Director of the Working Families Party-aligned Center for Working Families to develop and pass Green Homes/ Green Jobs NY and Fair Share Tax Reform in NYS. He currently teaches Sociology at Bronx Community College, serves on the advisory boards of American Farmland Trust-New York and Partners for Climate Action, and is an elected councilperson on the Town of Philipstown Board. Together, Jason and his partner Jocelyn Apicello live and work on Longhaul Farm in Garrison, NY with their two young children and several farmyard animals. At Longhaul Farm, they practice sustainable living and agriculture, including running a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program for fifty families, a diversified, free-range livestock program, and making, baking, canning, pickling, cutting, cooking, growing and mending various things.

Lauren Baker is Deputy Director of the Global Alliance for the Future of Food. A systems thinker, skilled facilitator and practical problem-solver, Lauren has worked in nonprofit, government, academic, business, and philanthropic contexts. In leadership roles, Lauren supports diverse organizations and initiatives including the True Cost Accounting Accelerator, Transformational Investing in Food Systems, the Agroecology Coalition, the People's Food Institute, Agritecture, and Food Secure Canada, to address global challenges related to climate, biodiversity, food security, and equity. She is a Sylff Fellow. Lauren is the author of numerous articles and publications, including Corn meets Maize: Food Movements and Markets in Mexico (2013), co-editor of True Cost

Accounting for Food: Balancing the Scale (2021), and most recently Earth to Tables Legacies, Multimedia Food Conversations Across Generations and Cultures (2023). She lives in Toronto, Canada where she enjoys canoeing and kayaking with her husband and two sons.

Founder and CEO, AHAM Education

Knellee Bisram, M.A. transitioned from her career in international relations and international consulting to dedicate her efforts to AHAM Education and partnerships that build mindful, resilient communities. Serving as Lead NGO Representative to the United Nations, she leverages regional, national and global multi-stakeholder partners to bring a nature-based, mindful approach to meeting 21st century global challenges affecting children, women, marginalized communities in education, water and climate justice, and women's well-being. Her areas of expertise are land rights, climate change and biodiversity conservation, women economic empowerment, youth leadership and

representation in decision making. She is one of the members of the Indigenous Peoples Advisory Group (IPAG) of the Green Climate Fund (GCF) and the current chair of the IPAG.

Balky is a holder of a Bachelor's Degree in English Modern Letters from the University of Yaounde 1 and a Professional Master's Degree in International Relations, specialized in International Cooperation, Humanitarian Action and Sustainable Development from the International Relations Institute of Cameroon (IRIC). Soon enough she was manager of the cheese department and swept into the mesmeric food world of early-1980s New York, which tipped its hat to the qualities of traditional cooking while experimenting with novel approaches.

She went on to become the chef at Exile, then at Peter Dent Catering, both in Tribeca. Shelley opened the first Dean & DeLuca Espresso Bar at the Paramount in Midtown, then began working as a private caterer in the city. She has published recipes in various journals and books, including the New York Times and Food & Wine Magazine, Recipes From America's Small Farms, and co-wrote The International Mail Order Gourmet, a food guide, with friend Jamie Harrison.

Since forming Fresh Company Shelley has cooked for such personalities as the Dalai Lama and Mikhail Gorbachev. She is a founding member of the Cold Spring Farmer's Market and works in the Hudson Valley region to promote local foodmakers and farmers.

Shelley Boris is the chef at the Garrison Institute and is a partner at Fresh Company, where she is the creative director and executive chef. Teresa Corçao

Founder & President, Maniva Institute

Teresa Corçao is the Founder & President of Instituto Maniva (www.institutomaniva.org), an organization that protects and promotes sustainable food systems, traditional knowledge in food, improvement in the life of small holder farmers in Brazil/Rio de Janeiro State and in Amazon Biome. Her main target groups include chefs, cooks and food activists. After joining the Slow Food Movement in 2001, Teresa started Projeto Mandioca in 2002 in order to teach public school children from the slums about manioc, an important Brazilian heritage food. Using history, folklore, and cooking classes, Teresa taught children how to prepare tapiocas and manioc crepes, while also simultaneously teaching them about their culture.

Teresa made a documentary in 2004 entitled The Manioc Flour Professor about a manioc producer in the Amazon. This documentary was shown in Dallas, Texas, as part of the 2005 Convention of the International Association of Culinary Professionals. She made a second documentary, Mr. Bené Goes to Italy, which was exhibited at the Slow Food on Film festival

and at the 2008 International Berlin Film Festival. As a result of the films' popularity, Teresa founded the Instituto Maniva in 2007 to protect and promote Brazilian food culture and small holder farmers through films, TV shows and cooking classes for youngsters and children. Teresa joined several well-known chefs in Rio to found the group Ecochefs in 2007, which became the heart of Maniva. Led by Teresa, Ecochefs Maniva catalyzed changes in production within the Brazilian food chain promoting ancestral food. In 2011, the group began to work side by side with organic family agriculture farmers in the Jardim Botanico organic farmers market, which is part of the Circuito Carioca de Feiras Or ganicas, in partnership with the Associação Biológica de Agricultores Familiares do Rio de Janeiro.

A self-taught chef, Teresa graduated from Pontifócia Universidade Católica PUC- RJ in 1975 with a degree in graphic design. She fell in love with cooking during her two year stay in London, where she initially realized the strong connection between food and culture. In 2020 due to the COVID pandemic she closed the restaurant and went back to the Academic world in a master's degree in design to deepen her knowledge about the food systems communication.

nature and health research; (ii) a pilot study on the Earthhealth connection using a coherence model (i.e., life is as an interconnected whole, links between soil and plants microbiology, human gut bacteria and emotions); (iii) and a collaboration in Ecuador, Peru, and Bolivia to share Andean perspectives to understand health and well-being effects of disconnecting from traditional agroecosystems and Mother Nature.

Ali Ghiorse is a bridge-builder and network weaver with over thirty years as a social and food justice advocate. A former chef, Ali sees society's most pressing issues through a food systems lens. She dedicated her career to helping advance transformation within the food system through her work as co-founder of Savory Thymes in Marin County, CA and most recently as founder of The Foodshed Network (TFN), based in Fairfield County, CT. Ali studied psychology at Mills College and the culinary arts at the Natural Gourmet Cookery School in Manhattan. Upon moving back to Greenwich, CT after living in the Bay Area for 24 years, she noticed that the food systems sector was not contextually understood or adequately represented, and a bridge-building entity for communities was missing. She established TFN in 2020, to meet the need for stronger connectivity, to provide space for education and advocacy, and to amplify the many values based, grassroots, community led initiatives in Greenwich, Fairfield County and Connecticut.

Alongside her work for TFN, she serves on the Greenwich Sustainability Committee as the Food Systems-Sector Co-Chair, as a member of the Greenwich Community Garden Advisory Board, Waste Free Greenwich Advisory Board and as a member of the Representative Town Meeting. Statewide, Ali participates in initiatives such as Stamford Food Collaborative, Connecticut Food Justice Network, CT Farm to School Collaborative and the School Meals 4

Tiokasin Ghosthorse

Founder, Host & Executive Producer, First Voices Radio

Tiokasin Ghosthorse is a member of the Cheyenne River Lakota Nation of South Dakota and has a long history with Indigenous activism and advocacy. Tiokasin is the Founder, Host and Executive Producer of "First Voices Radio" (formerly "First Voices Indigenous Radio") for the last 30 years in New York City and Seattle/Olympia, Washington. In 2016, he received a Nomination for the Nobel Peace Prize from the International Institute of Peace Studies and Global Philosophy. Other recent recognitions include: Native Arts and Cultures Foundation National Fellowship in Music (2016), National Endowment for the Arts National Heritage Fellowship Nominee (2017), Indigenous Music Award Nominee for Best Instrumental Album (2019) and National Native American Hall of Fame Nominee (2018. 2019). He also was recently nominated for "Nominee for the 2020 Americans for the Arts Johnson Fellowship for Artists Transforming Communities". Tiokasin is a "perfectly flawed human being."

Gillian Goddard

Co-Founder, The Alliance of Rural Communities & The Cross- Atlantic Chocolate Collective

Gillian Goddard is a systems thinker, community organizer, and chocolate maker who engages with food and agriculture as a means of instigating change. She has been gardening and farming indigenous style for over three decades.

Founder of the Alliance of Rural Communities (ARC), a non-profit where rural residents, with urban partners, create communities of intention around the principles of regenerative farming, sustainable rural livelihood creation, and circular economy. ARC started in Trinidad and Tobago in 2014 and has spread throughout the Caribbean region to Dominica, St. Lucia, St Kitts and Nevis and Guyana. In 2021, Goddard expanded her community of intention across the Atlantic Ocean, as the Founder and Convenor

of the Cross Atlantic Chocolate Collective. The Collective unites farming communities from Africa to the Caribbean, to North America to Europe. Countries include Malawi, Tanzania, Uganda, Ghana, Nigeria, Cameroon, Cote D'Ivoire, Jamaica, Dominica, Grenada, St. Lucia, Trinidad and Tobago, Denmark and the United States.

By combining experiences and stories involving food and community Goddard tackles complex issues around power, decolonization, and emancipation. In 2022, the Inter-American Institute for Cooperation on Agriculture (IICA) awarded Goddard with the "Soul of Rurality" award for her work in enhancing rural communities, protecting biodiversity, and improving food security.

Ron Gonen

Founder & CEO, Closed Loop Partners

Ron is the Founder and CEO of Closed Loop Partners, a firm focused on building the circular economy. Closed Loop Partners manages capital for leading consumer goods companies, technology companies, retailers, financial institutions, family offices and endowments focused on investments that seek strong financial returns and tangible social impact.

Prior to Closed Loop Partners, Ron was the Deputy Commissioner of Sanitation, Recycling and Sustainability in New York City in the Bloomberg Administration. He oversaw the collection and processing of NYC's paper, metal, glass, plastic, textile waste, electronic waste, organics, and hazardous waste as well as public policy. In 2013, NRDC and Earth Day New York named Ron as the Public Official of the Year in New York City. During his career, Ron has been recognized with a number of business and environmental awards including recognition as a 'Champion of the Earth' by the United Nations Environment Program which is the highest distinction for environmental protection given by the United Nations and recognizes outstanding visionaries and leaders in the fields of policy, science and entrepreneurship and the Medal of Excellence from Columbia University which recognizes alumnus under the age of 45 for excellence in scholarship, public service and professional life The companies that he has led have been recognized as innovators in sustainable business practices. Recognitions include The Conference of Mayors - Public/ Private Partnership of the Year, Technology Pioneer from the World Economic Forum and the Wall Street Journal's 1 Venture Backed Cleantech Company of The Year. Ron is the author of a number of patents in the areas of technology and environmental science.

Ron received his MBA from Columbia Business School. He returned to Columbia as an Adjunct Professor for several years. His first book, The Waste-Free World, was published by Penguin Random House in 2022.

Hannah Gosnell

Professor, Oregon State University

Hannah Gosnell's research focuses on transformations to sustainability, agricultural landscape change, rural sustainability, and land and water conservation from a social- ecological systems perspective. She is especially interested in how views, laws, and institutions evolve to reflect changing geographies and under what conditions they can facilitate transformation in practical, political, and personal spheres. Hannah's work reflects a belief that collaborative and interdisciplinary solutions to conservation challenges involving all affected stakeholders are likely to be more durable and equitable than ones that are top-down or purely technical. Most of her projects take place on rural, agricultural, working landscapes involving both public and private lands in the U.S. West, and they all deal with various aspects of environmental governance - the processes of decision-making involved in the control and management of the environment and natural resources.

Larisa Jacobson

Climate Justice & Advocacy Co-Director, NEFOC Land Trust

Rooted by ancestors who tended mountainside maize and millet, Larisa "Lala" Jacobson is a land and story steward sowing seeds of transformation.

As Climate Justice & Advocacy Co-Director, Lala advocates for climate stewardship supports for farmers and land stewards, fostering leadership and collaborative policy development among our members and connections with other Black and Indigenous-led land sovereignty efforts and coalitions. Lala is also a 2023-2024 Castanea Fellow.

Having begun farming over 25 years ago, with farming experience at a variety of scales in urban and rural settings, and roots in community health and youth leadership, Lala previously served as Farm Director and Co-Executive Director of Soul Fire Farm, where she incorporated many

ancestral plants and practices, coordinated 100+ member weekly Solidarity Share food deliveries, co-hosted weeklong farmers immersion programs for hundreds of BIPOC land stewards, co-developed the inaugural Braiding Seeds Fellowship, created resource guides, produced the bilingual Liberation on Land Skillshare Video Series, and focused on relationship with the original land stewards, the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of the Mohican Nation. A founding member of the NEFOC Network, Interim Council, and Board, Lala has worked alongside farmers in Ghana, Mexico, Haiti, and Guatemala; coordinated a school for youth on the autism spectrum; taught workshops ranging from crop planning, climate resilient farming, tractors, and soil love to uprooting racism in land- grant universities' extension systems; amplified stories shared by Black and Brown youth pushed out of high school; organized for collective land reclamation by elders and youth growing food in public housing; collaborated with disabled community leaders demanding health care change; and managed a farm outside Boston offering land and culturally relevant food for migrant and refugee communities. With children and elders at its heart, Lala's work seeks to support ancestral and other practices for caring for soil and ecosystems during the age of climate crisis, and Black and Brown people reclaiming our sacred roles as mediators between soil and sky in the collective of beings we know as Land.

Juan Carlos Jintiach Arcos, current Executive Secretary of the Global Alliance of Territorial Communities (AGCT), recently nominated as a candidate for the Nobel Peace Prize 2023, belongs to the Shuar people of the Ecuadorian Amazon. Partner and active member of the Interprovincial Federation of Shuar Centers of Ecuador - FICSH, member organization of the Confederation of Indigenous Nationalities of the Ecuadorian Amazon - CONFENIAE, former coordinator of International Cooperation of the Coordinator of Indigenous Organizations of the Amazon Basin - COICA, Former Parliamentary Advisor to an Amazonian Indigenous Congresswoman now known as the National Assembly of Ecuador, former Coordinator of the Inter-federal Committee in resistance against extractive industries (mining and oil) that affected the territories of indigenous organizations such as: FICSH, NAE and NASHE. He studied Natural Resources Management -Environmental Control and Environmental Administration

at the University of San Francisco de Quito - Ecuador, an International Diploma from the International Center for Education and Training of Indigenous Peoples of the University of Nuuk Greenland on the theme: "Indigenous Peoples in the International System".

After receiving a fully funded scholarship up to PhD, from The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, Henry completed his B.A. from Binghamton University, and finished his graduate studies at New York University (NYU). In pursuit of purpose and abundance, Henry traveled the world, studied abroad and later lived in Cuba where he filmed a Documentary on the commodification of Afro-Cuban Religions. Subsequently, Henry moved to Brazil and studied entrepreneurship, through a United Nations program in Rio De Janeiro. While working as a Spanish and Portuguese linguist, Henry studied to become a Certified Tea Master from The American Tea Masters Association. Henry's entrepreneurial spirit developed an idea to bring health to underrepresented communities through food, drinks and overall wellness.

Henry became a community organizer and activist in the Bronx out of the passion for creating solutions to the oppressive realities around health and wellness in his community, which is considered one of the largest food deserts and the poorest congressional district in the United States. After implementing an awarded grant from the USDA, Henry started creating solutions for the food desert realities; access to food became a focal point and an

obsession to implement programs for those social ills and creating a coalition of community organizations and local community gardens in the name of access.

Henry founded The United Business Cooperative (UBC), a business and community cooperative based in the South Bronx, the first of its kind and winner of the Thrive Competition award from the New York City Economic Development Corporation (NYCEDC), as the most innovative immigrant organization.

As the appointed President of the UBC, Henry also created well-known initiatives around health in the Bronx, one of them being the famed The Bronx Salad. Thus, Henry decided to build on everything he created to start a revolution around Food and Tech, launching BORN JUICE: a social-entrepreneurship venture, focused on sustainable, zero-carbon-footprint, zero-waste, hyper-local food, grown with hydroponic technology, to produce plant-based food in his beloved Bronx.

Sara Omi

Women's Representative, Global Alliance of Territorial Communities

Sara Omi is an Emberá Lawyer and defender of Indigenous Rights. Founder of the Emberá Artisan Women Association (AMARIE-Emberá) that promotes the cultural and economic empowerment of Emberá Women through the rescue of traditional knowledge. President of the Territorial Women Leaders of the Mesoamerican Alliance of People and Forest and chosen to represent the Women in the Global Alliance of Territorial Communities. Karen Spiller

Thomas W. Haas Professor in Sustainable Food Systems, University of New Hampshire

As the Thomas W. Haas Professor in Sustainable Food Systems at University of New Hampshire (UNH), Durham, NH, Karen's primary responsibility is to connect the community-engaged, transdisciplinary work of Food Solutions New England (FSNE), and in particular, its racial equity work, to students, faculty, and staff at UNH through lectures, workshops, and collaborative scholarship. The Haas Professorship was established to deepen the ties between UNH and the New England food system; by serving as a "Professor of Practice", Karen brings unique community and practitioner perspectives into the UNH sustainable learning community.

Karen is Principal of KAS Consulting and provides mission-based consulting with a focus on resource matching, board development, and strategic planning for health and equity- focused initiatives. She has extensive experience in working with youth, young adults, and community members in a variety of educational and training programs. Karen serves on national and regional committees and leads teams committed to creating an equitable public health and sustainable food systems with a number of organizations and initiatives including Society for Public Health Education (SOPHE). As national SOPHE Chair of Chapter Development, she managed the coordination and collaboration of SOPHE's 21 chapters across the United States for more than three years.

Involved in state-wide and regional food system work, Karen is an engaged steering committee member of the FSNE network. She serves as Massachusetts Ambassador for its New England Food Vision linking the racial equity commitment, work and lived experiences of students; residents; organizations; and communities of color to the evolving food system work happening across the New England states. Karen serves local, state and regional organizations in various roles that include board membership of Boston Food Forest Coalition, Sustainable Business Network of Massachusetts, Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Working Group and AMIBA - American Independent Business Alliance.

Woody Tasch

Founder, Slow Money Institute

Woody Tasch is the author of Inquiries into the Nature of Slow Money: Investing as if Food, Farms, and Fertility Mattered (Chelsea Green), SOIL: Notes Towards the Theory and Practice of Nurture Capital (Slow Money Institute), and AHA!: Fake Trillions, Real Billions, Beetcoin and the Great American Do-Over (Slow Money Institute). Tasch is former chairman of Investors' Circle, a nonprofit angel network that has facilitated more than \$200 million of investments in over 300 early-stage, sustainability-promoting companies. As treasurer of the Jessie Smith Noyes Foundation in the 1990s, he was a pioneer of mission-related investing. He was founding chairman of the Community Development Venture Capital Alliance. Utne Reader named him "One Of 25 Visionaries Who Are Changing Your World."

Michael Tetreault

Chief People Officer, The Nature Conservancy

As TNC's inaugural Chief People Officer since 2015, Mike leads the team charged with ensuring our colleagues are equipped to deliver on our mission and to thrive in the organization. This team is focused on supporting a healthy organizational culture; creating a strategic and agile organization-wide approach to attracting, developing, and deploying our global workforce; and updating our human resources systems and operations to meet the needs of a growing organization. Under Mike's leadership, the People Team doubled from 60 to more than 120 staff from 2019-2022 to strategically meet TNC's expanding human resources needs.

Mike began his TNC career in 1998 as the Yampa River Program Manager in western Colorado, where he worked closely with landowners and community leaders to conserve this free-flowing tributary to the Colorado River and the surrounding watershed. With more than a decade of experience, Jean's work focuses on advancing equity and justice in our food system through building partnerships, institutional and community organizing, and movement building. Jean is the founder of Health Equity Resources and Education and a trainer with the Racial Equity Institute. Alongside her colleagues, she has worked with 100+ nonprofit, corporate, community, municipal, and federal institutions including the NIH, CDC, and others. In collaboration with LaShauna Austria and Seeds of Change Consulting, Jean has worked with land trusts and other organizations including the Triangle Land Conservancy and the Massachusetts Food System Collaborative.

Jean's writing on race, climate, and the food system have appeared in YES! Magazine, and her poetry has appeared in Colorado Review, Minnesota Review, The Shore, and elsewhere. Her book Nature's Remedies: An Illustrated Guide to Healing Herbs was published by Chronicle Books. Raised in housing projects in and around Little Rock, Arkansas during a massive ramp up of the War on Drugs, she lived in concentrated poverty growing up and left to attend high school in Los Angeles, California. Drawing from her family's experiences as poor, landless, white sharecroppers in the rural South, after first pursuing a career in public health she found a calling in the movement to transform the food system from an exploitative, exclusive industry into a regenerative, inclusive expression of care and respect for land and community. Jean and her partner currently call north central Florida home.

Diana Ugalde

Learning Lead, Healthy Food Healthy Planet

Diana started as a Programme Officer within Healthy Food Healthy Planet in September 2022. In this role she is the linchpin between the Pooled Fund and the CSO movement, serving both constituencies.

Diana is originally from Costa Rica, where she studied Human Nutrition. She later came to Europe to complete an Erasmus Master's Degree in Food Identity and a PhD in Food Sciences. During her career she has led projects engaging with different actors like consumers, producers and researchers in Costa Rica, Romania and France related to improving food environments and diets, environmental production practices and participatory approaches.


